A reading from the epistle of the holy Apostle Paul to the Galatians.

Brothers and sisters in Christ: See with what large letters I have written¹ to you with my own hand! As many as desire to make a good showing in the flesh, these would compel you to be circumcised, only that they may not suffer persecution for the cross of Christ.² For not even those who are circumcised keep the law, but they desire to have you circumcised that they may boast in your flesh. But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ,3 by whom the world has been crucified to me,4 and I to the world. For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision avails anything, but a new creation⁵. And as many as walk according to this rule, peace and mercy be upon them, and

upon the Israel of God. From now on let no one trouble me, for I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus. Brothers and sisters, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen.

"Then he cried and said, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus that he may dip the tip of his finger in water and cool

¹ I have written: Paul penned the postscript of Galatians himself, whereas the body of the letter was dictated to a secretary. He writes with large letters either for emphasis or because of poor eyesight.

² The Judaizers were driven by fear of persecution, probably from Jewish nationalists who pressured them to make circumcision the focus of their missionary efforts. Paul accuses them of abandoning the true gospel, not out of conviction, but out of cowardice.

³ How does one **boast . . . in the cross**? Throughout the history of the Church, Christians have preached the Cross, displayed the Cross in their homes and altars, venerated the Cross in the liturgy, and signed themselves with the Cross in worship of the Holy Trinity and during times of fear or temptation.

⁴ **crucified to me:** Paul reiterates what he said earlier in 2:20 and 5:24 that in Christ our sins and worldly passions are put to death. Paul thus emphasizes that the Cross—not circumcision—is the sign of our salvation.

⁵ A new creation: The indwelling of the Spirit renes us from within and makes us sharers in the divine life. The regenerating grace of the New Covenant will eventually permeate the entire cosmos.

⁶ marks of the Lord Jesus: Property and slaves in the ancient world were branded with a mark of ownership. Paul views himself as a slave of Christ who bears physical scars from the many persecutions that accompanied his apostolic work.

my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame.' But Abraham said, 'Son, remember that in your lifetime you received your good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things; but now he is comforted and you are tormented. And besides all this, between us and you there is a great gulf fixed, so that those who want to pass from here to you cannot, nor can those from there pass to us.' "Then he said, 'I beg you therefore, father, that you would send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, that he may testify to them, lest they also come to this place of torment. Abraham said to him, 'They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them.' And he said, 'No, father Abraham; but if one goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' But he said to him, 'If they do not hear Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded though one rise from the dead.""

NOV. 1: RETURN TO REGULAR PRACTICE OF DISTRIBUTING HOLY COMMUNION. "The Covid-19 pandemic required our parishes to find alternate ways to distribute the Divine Eucharist in order to ensure the health and well-being of our faithful, namely, using individual "single-use" Holy Communion spoons. For some time now, most Ukrainian Catholic Churches throughout the world have returned to our regular practice in

distributing the Divine Eucharist, using a single common spoon for all. It is time for our Eparchy to do the same.

allow for However, to some time communities to transition, pastors may implement either of the following practices wherever some of the faithful still wish to receive Holy Communion with individual spoons. 1) In parishes where only one priest distributes Holy Communion, he begins by distributing Holy Communion with "singleuse" spoons to those who desire this, before using the common spoon for others. 2) In parishes where the Eucharist is distributed from several chalices, some ministers use one common spoon while others use individual "single-use" spoons. The manner in which the Divine Eucharist is distributed should not be an obstacle to those desiring to be nourished by the life-giving Body and Blood of Our Lord. May the Holy Eucharist be our strength and nourishment in our journey towards holiness." It would be best for us to take the month of October to prepare our faithful for this change, including a reminder of the manner in which we receive the Holy Eucharist, taking care to avoid unnecessary contact with the spoon. While remaining respectful of each parishioners' individual experience, pastors should reassure them of 1) the reduced threat from the Corona Virus, no longer considered a pandemic, and 2) of the value of distributing the Eucharist to the faithful via a single spoon, reorienting them to this long-standing tradition and the reverence for the Holy Mysteries that it helps to foster.

LEARNING TO SEE AND SERVE CHRIST IN POOR LAZARUS

It is tempting to think that those who seem to have it all in this world are God's favorites whose success is a reward for holiness and virtue. It is appealing to think that God's kingdom is simply an eternal manifestation of the arrangements of this world, of life as we know it, where the powerful usually lord it over the weak and the rich almost always seem to get their way.

The parable of Lazarus and the rich man powerfully warns again that temptation, for it shows that those who love, worship, and serve only themselves, ultimately become blind to Christ Whom they encounter in the poor and needy. It shows that in God's kingdom, the humble will be exalted, blessed, and comforted, while the high and mighty will be put down. The issue, of course, is not simply how much money one has, but whether

we have opened our souls in humility to personal union with the Lord such that His mercy, love, and holiness have become characteristic of us. The issue is whether we have been healed of the ravages of sin, whether our spiritual vision has been filled with light that overcomes the darkness within us. Ultimately, the question is whether we have become living icons of Jesus Christ.

The rich man ignored the clear teachings of Moses and the prophets on his obligation to care for his poor neighbors. By literally stepping over the wretched beggar Lazarus on his porch time and time again, he blinded himself to the humanity of one created in the image and likeness of God and with whom Christ identified Himself as "the least of these my brethren." He ignored God every time that he ignored his neighbor. This blindness became so characteristic of the rich man that. once he departed this life, he was unable to behold the brilliant glory of God and could perceive only a tormenting flame. St. Isaac the Syrian referred to the sufferings of those in Hades as "the scourge of love." In other words, God's love remains eternally, but some become so distorted by self-centeredness, disregard for their neighbors, and hatred of God that they are incapable of experiencing being in the presence of the Lord as anything other than the torment of "bitter regret." They suffer the consequences of their own selfimposed rejection of a relationship with Him.

We do not yet have the eyes to see it, but everything that we say, do, and think in this life shapes who we are before God, both now and for eternity. That is especially true in matters relating to other people, particularly those who are needy, inconvenient, and easy to overlook. Whether we liked it or not, our Lord has identified Himself with them. If we say that we love and serve Him while disregarding the poor, sick, and lonely, we are simply deceiving ourselves.

Our Lord brought salvation to the world by lowering Himself even to the point of death on the Cross, burial in a tomb, and descent into Hades. He went to the place of the dead in order to look for fallen Adam and Eve and to set them, and all the departed, free from the slavery to sin and death that had so distorted their ancient glory as those created to become like God in holiness. Having lowered Himself out of love, Christ rose in glory and brought them into the eternal presence of God.

We will take our place in this narrative of salvation by manifesting in our own lives the descent of the Savior into a world corrupted by sin and death out of love for others. We will find the healing of our souls as we learn to see, serve, and love Christ in the people we encounter every day. The point is not to attempt to use God in order to get what we want in this life or the next, but instead to find the fullness of life in Him by joining ourselves to the selfless offering that Lord has made on the Cross for the salvation of the world.

We will have good hope of rising with Him in glory when we serve Him in the Lazarus's we encounter daily. Already today, right now, we may participate in the great reversal of God's Kingdom by blessing those who are last in the world as we know it. In serving them, we serve Jesus Christ. When we call out for His mercy as we struggle to live faithfully in this way, we will behold a measure of the divine glory and find ourselves already participating in the eternal Reign of God.

Holy and Glorious Great Martyr Demetrius the Myrrh-Streaming

Demetrius was born in Thessalonica, the capital city of the Roman province of Macedonia, in approximately the year 270 AD. His parents were of noble ancestry, and secretly, devout Christians. His father was the governor and military commander of Thessalonica

The family home served as a secret house church for Christians. This is where Demetrius was baptized and raised in the faith. He was well educated, intelligent, athletic and heroic in spirit. As a soldier in the Roman Army, he quick rose to a high officer's rank at a young age. Despite his success in the military, Demetrius considered himself first to be a soldier of Christ, His King and God, and then second, a soldier of Rome. He remained fervent in faith and good works, bringing many to faith in Christ, and encouraging those



who were suffering persecution for the sake of Christ.

In the year 305, Galerius Maximian became the emperor of the eastern part of the Roman Empire, while Diocletian ruled in Rome as the senior emperor of the western part of the Empire. After the death of Demetrius' father, the emperor Galerius Maximian, confident in the leadership, administrative and military abilities of Demetrius, appointed him to succeed his father as governor and military commander of Thessalonica. The main task that was assigned to Demetrius was to protect the city from foreign invasion and the eradicate Christianity. The policy regarding Christians was expressed simply, "Put to death anyone who calls on the name of Christ." The emperor did not suspect that by appointing Demetrius as governor, he had provided a way for him to lead many people to faith in Christ.

As the new governor and military commander of Thessalonica, Demetrius began to openly teach the Christian faith to inhabitants of the city, and to overthrow pagan customs and idolatry. According to St. Symeon Metaphrastes, a writer who compiled the lives of the saints, Demetrius, by his teaching zeal, became "a second Paul" for Thessalonica, a city where Paul himself had established the first community of believers (1 and 2 Thessalonians).

The Lord also destined Demetrius to follow the holy Apostle Paul on the road to martyrdom. It was soon reported to Galerius Maximian that the newly-appointed governor was a Christian, and that he was converting many to the Christian faith. Returning from a military campaign against the Sarmatians in the Black Sea region, the emperor decided to enter the city of Thessalonica with his army and to deal with the situation.

Knowing what lay ahead for him, Demetrius ordered his faithful servant Lupus to distribute all his possessions to the poor after his death. He then began to pray and to fast, preparing himself for martyrdom.

When the emperor came into the city, he summoned Demetrius to appear before him. Standing before the emperor, Demetrius openly confessed that he was a Christian, and that no power would force him to renounce Christ the Saviour. The emperor then gave orders to bind him and to throw him into prison. While praying in his prison cell, an angel of heaven appeared to Demetrius, strengthening and comforting him with the hope of a speedy martyr's death.

While in Thessalonica, the emperor decided to celebrate his recent victory in battle with games and sacrifices. His champion in the arena was a giant man named Lyaeus. As part of the festivities, Galerius Maximian offered a rich reward to any Thessalonian who would battle one-on-one with his prize gladiator. A special arena was prepared, with a bed of upright spears on each side.

In Thessalonica, there was young Christian, Nestor, who was willing to take up the challenge. He first came to visit Demetrius in prison to receive his blessing. In prayer, Demetrius received a prophet word from God. He blessed Nestor and said to him, 'You will overcome him, but you will suffer for Christ.' Nestor went to the place where the games and festivities were taking place, and he entered into the arena to fight the gladiator Lyaeus, one-on-one. The crowd expected a quick victory for Lyaeus, but to their surprise, Nestor proved to be a worthy opponent.

Having invoked the name of Jesus the Christ, and making the sign of the cross, Nestor fought Lyaeus in the arena and overcame him. He then thrust him onto the bed of spears where the giant gladiator died.

When the emperor heard Nestor invoke Christ, he was enraged. Rather than reward him for his victory, he gave orders to behead Nestor with a sword. And so, Nestor suffered a martyr's death for the sake of Christ. The prophetic word received by Demetrius was fulfilled.

Then, the emperor learned that Nestor had visited Demetrius in prison to receive his blessing for victory. To avenge the death of his gladiator, he gave orders to have Demetrius killed. Soldiers were sent to the to prison and they stabbed Demetrius to death with their spears. This happened on the 26th day of October, in the year 306.

Lupus, the faithful servant of Demetrius, dipped his garment into his blood, and he collected the soil that was soaked with the martyr's blood into an earthen vessel. The body of Demetrius was buried close to the site of his martyrdom.

In the year 313 AD, the Western emperor, Constantine, met with the Eastern emperor, Licinius, in the city of Milan, Italy. As part of their discussions, they issued a joint statement, later known as the Edict of Milan. This proclamation gave full rights to all Christian citizens of the Roman Empire, restoring their property, releasing them from prisons, and effectively banning government persecution of the Christian faith. The edict also declared a general state of tolerance for all religions. After nearly three hundred years of persecution, Christians were free to practice their faith openly.

Soon after, during the reign of the emperor Constantine (306-337), a small church was built over the site of St. Demetrius' martyrdom, and numerous miracles continued to take place. In the years that followed, the inhabitants of Thessalonica would often invoke the prayers and intercession of St. Demetrius, and they were not disappointed. The survival of the city from foreign invasion, famine, pestilence, and natural disasters was accredited to the intercession of St. Demetrius.

In the fifth century, the prefect Leontius visited the small church dedicated to St. Demetrius, and he was miraculously healed. To express his gratitude to God, Leontius constructed a large and beautiful three-aisled basilica on the same site, replacing the original church. During the construction, the relics of St. Demetrius were uncovered, and a fragrant myrrh was found exuding from his relics. The relics of the saint were then transferred to special ciborium, and set in the centre aisle of the church.

This 5th century basilica burned down in the seventh century; and soon after, a larger five-aisled basilica was constructed (629-634). During Turkish occupation, in 1493, the church was converted to a mosque. It was restored to Christian worship after the liberation of Thessalonica from the Turks in 1912. Unfortunately, the basilica was destroyed in the great fire of 1917. It was restored and re-dedicated in the year 1949. Every year, at the feast of St. Demetrius on October 26), the ciborium is opened and the fragrance of the myrrh can be detected several blocks away from the church.

The Holy and Great Martyr Demetrius continues to be the patron saint of the city of

Thessalonica, and the patron saint of many churches built in his honour throughout the world.

Troparion, Tone 3: In you, O martyr Demetrius,* the world has discovered a champion in its travails,* for you have routed the nations* and so, as you smashed the pride of Lyaeus,* encouraging Nestor to struggle,* pray to Christ our God to grant great mercy to our souls.

Kontakion, Tone 2: With streams of your blood, O Demetrius,* God, who gave you invincible strength,* has dyed the Church in royal crimson* and preserved your city invulnerable* for you are its fortification.

Abbot of the Holy Dormition Univ Lavra Named Archbishop and Metropolitan of Prešov

His Holiness Pope Francis named the Rev. Fr. Jonah Maxim, Abbot of the Holy Dormition Univ Lavra, Archbishop, and Metropolitan of Prešov (Slovakia), the Holy See press service reports.



The Reverend Hieromonk Jonah was born November 21, 1974, in Levoca, Slovakia. He received his initial theological education at the **Prešov** Seminary. On July 11, 1998, he was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Jan Hir ka. In the autumn of 2004, he entered the Holy Dormition Univ Lavra. In 2018, he defended his PhD on Studite monasticism at the Pontifical Oriental Institute in Rome. Afterward, he served as abbot at St. Michael's Monastery in Lviv. On June 18, 2020, he was elected abbot of the Holy Dormition Univ Lavra. Apart from Slovak and Ukrainian, he speaks Italian, English, French, Polish and German.

The Head of the UGCC addresses participants of the XII World Congress of Ukrainians: "Be evangelizers of the truth about the struggle of Ukraine"

On Sunday, October 22nd, the XII Congress of the Ukrainian World Congress convened with the election of a new UWC leadership as one of its agenda items. Use the instruments at your disposal to open the world's eyes to the ideology of the Russkiy mir, which has led to numerous destructions and, most terribly, the deaths of thousands of civilians in our country," His Beatitude Sviatoslav urged.

The Head of the UGCC also asked the UWC members to focus their attention on the future, in which "a free and victorious nation must make great efforts to restore what was destroyed brutally." "You have many tasks ahead of you," said the Patriarch, "but I believe that your enthusiasm and your love for your homeland will give you the strength and inspiration to accomplish everything planned for the welfare of the global Ukrainian community."

Invoking the Holy Spirit's blessings upon the participants of the XII UWC Congress so that they may serve the people of Ukraine with dignity, the Head of the UGCC bestowed his hierarchical blessing upon them.
